



President issues federal decrees appointing new envoys

PRESIDENT His Highness Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan has issued Federal Decrees on the appointment, promotion and transfer of a number of UAE ambassadors accredited to foreign countries.

The decrees stipulate the transfer of Mohammad Salem Al Rashidi, UAE Ambassador to Senegal, and his appointment as the new UAE Ambassador to Ethiopia. With this, Al Rashidi ends his duties as a Non-Resident Ambassador to the Republic of the Gambia, the Republic of Sierra Leone, the Republic of Cape Verde, and the Republic of Ivory Coast.

Meanwhile, Dr Hessa Abdullah Al Otaiba, UAE Ambassador to Spain, was appointed as the UAE Ambassador to the Kingdom of the Netherlands, concluding her duties as a Non-Resident Ambassador to the State of Andorra and the Vatican State.

- Ahmed Ibrahim Al Dhaheri is appointed as the UAE's Consul-General in Erbil, Iraq.
- Salem Ali Khamis Alawi Al Kaabi is appointed as UAE's Consul-General in Bonn, Germany.
- Nasser Haweden Al Ketbi is appointed as the UAE's Consul-General in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.
- Hamad Matar Mohammed Al Shamsi, member of the diplomatic and consular corps, has been promoted to the rank of "Minister Plenipotentiary".



UAE Cabinet reviews government achievements in 2018

THE UAE Cabinet, chaired by His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, discussed in its first meeting of the year the achievements of the UAE Government in 2018.

Amonast the achievements of the government in 2018 that were presented were the allocation of Dhs 1 1 billion social assistance for the next three years to low-income Emiratis, the adoption of a plan for a housing project for citizens, and the approval of the largest federal budget amounting to Dhs 180 billion until 2020.

Other accomplishments tackled were the commencement of the National Policy for Senior Emiratis, a move that seeks to improve the lives of senior citizens in the country, and the adoption and approval of several federal laws in the medical sector.



Moreover, women in the legislation were also given equal pay as their male counterparts, while foreigners were allowed to own 100 percent in UAEbased businesses. The validity of visas for investors and professional talents was extended to up to 10 years. Programmes related to the conservation of

environment and food security, transportation, and people of determination were also presented.

"I am confident that my team will achieve our goals for the new year which will lead us to the achievement of the UAE Vision 2021," HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum said

Mohammed bin Rashid unveils 'Fifty-Year Charter' of Dubai



HIS Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, has unveiled 'The Fifty-Year Charter' which promises to further improve all aspects of life in the emirate of Dubai in 2019.

"This is a charter that represents our pledge and promise towards enhancing the life of people in Dubai in 2019," HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum said.

"It is an annual document that I have named 'The Fifty-Year Charter' to mark my 50th anniversary of assuming my first official post in serving my country, and in

the hope of another 50 years during which we will maintain a city governed by law and bound by the spirit of compassion, love harmony and tolerance. A prosperous city where future generations achieve their dreams and aspirations.

The unveiling of the Charter follows the release of a road map for the future success of the nation in the 'Eight Principles of Dubai', which aims to ensure the city's continued prosperity.

"On January 4, 2019, I declare my commitment, as well as the commitment of the ruling family of Dubai, and the commitment of our government and all our teams to the vision presented in this document," His Highness the Vice President penned in the introduction of the Charter.

'The Fifty-Year Charter' will be released on January 4 every year to announce exceptional projects in Dubai, and within the next 50 years, it says, the emirate of Dubai will be maintained as "a prosperous city where future generations achieve their dreams and aspirations".

The document does not seek to replace existing strategies – such as the Dubai Plan 2021, which aims to reinforce the emirate's position as a global centre for industry. It

instead seeks to follow the government's vision for the "life we wish to maintain for everyone living in this community".

The nine articles in the Charter include a proposal to foster a Dubai silk road in cooperation with "friendly neighbours", with the aim of reestablishing the city as a trade hub and as a crossroads of all nations across all continents

Blocking an international smuggling bid, Abu Dhabi Police relayed information to an Asian country that led to the seizure of 231kg of heroin from a fishing boat and the arrest of two suspects. It took place in December 2018, but the news was released in January 2019. The diplomatic mission of the target country thanked Abu Dhabi Police for their role.



A three-year-old boy was saved by his mother from their burning apartment building in Al Nuaimia 2 area through the help of a passerby. The boy was thrown by her mother from the second floor. Luckily, the male passerby caught the child, who escaped the blaze unscathed. The mother sustained multiple injuries. Ajman Civil Defence vehicles and ambulances evacuated other residents and controlled the fire. The fire started near a freezer and washing machine kept in the corridor of the building.



Two people were arrested for robbing a European man, aged 44, of Dhs2.3 million in cash. The victim had been given the bait of an unofficial money exchange – the suspects contacted the victim through a third party and told him that they wanted to exchange \$700,000 (Dhs2.57 million approx) into dirhams at a rate lower than the market rate. The victim brought the cash in a bag, and then was tricked into going to a location where he was beaten up and robbed.



An Arab boy, aged 16, who didn't even have a basic idea of driving took his brother's car out for a spin – and then he crashed into a lamppost and died. His friend, a passenger, was seriously injured. "He took the key without his brother's knowledge and tried to drive the car. Instead of applying the brakes when he saw the streetlight, he stepped on the accelerator and crashed," said a police official.





Ras Al Khaimah Municipality will auction off 104 unclaimed vehicles impounded over a period of six months. The director general of the RAK civic body said that the vehicles were impounded from various places in the emirate.



Eighty people were forced to evacuate an old industrial site in Umm Al Quwain after a fire broke out. Members of the civil defence rushed to the scene at 11pm and managed to bring the blaze under control. There were no casualties in the incident. Investigation on the cause of the fire is underway.



FUJAIRAH

The last day of 2018 was also the last day of a 45-year-old Asian man's life - he was killed in a road accident that took place at 6am, and he wasn't even driving. The victim was in the passenger seat of a pick-up vehicle, which collided with a truck. The pick-up driver was also seriously injured, and police said that his inattention was the cause of the accident.

FROM LISTENING TO A LONELY OLD MAN RECITING POETRY TO PAYING THE FINES OF A DISTRESSED MOTHER, MANY GOOD DEEDS BY THE POLICE IN THE UAE GO BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY

heir success is measured in many ways, from the Global Law and Order 2017 survey that shows the UAE to be amongst the safest countries in the world to the early adoption of technology to predict and prevent crime. Police forces in the UAE are also amongst the

world's most efficient and have the statistics to prove it. But are they only about strict law enforcement? What about their compassion and human values?

The finer emotions of the men in uniform cannot be logged; they remain in the memories of those whose lives the police have touched beyond the call of duty.



MAKE WAY FOR BABY

On the recent New Year's Eve celebration at Al Marjan Island in Ras Al Khaimah, the atmosphere was electric, the noise deafening and the sight of the fireworks lasting 13 minutes and 20 seconds and winner of the Guinness World Records for the 'Longest chain of fireworks' and the 'Longest straight line of fireworks' - was spectacular.

In this euphoria, who'd notice a pregnant woman suddenly developing labour pains? Who, but Ras Al Khaimah Police? As the woman went into labour amidst the partying crowds, RAK Police stepped in to help. The area was lined with thousands of vehicles, but a special traffic patrol opened the road and enabled an ambulance to leave with the woman. Thanks to their



intervention, she reached hospital on time. "She gave birth safely to a baby boy despite the New Year's Eve traffic when thousands of people from across the country flocked to Al Marjan Island to watch the fireworks," said Brigadier Abdjullah Ali Menakhas, Acting Director

General of Operations at RAK Police.

The proud parents have named the baby, Sultan. "We feel lucky to have found miraculous help amongst the sea of vehicles and people. The policemen, particularly the traffic patrols, were a great help," said the grateful parents.

INCREDIBLE GESTURE

On another occasion, a policeman in Dubai proved that responsibility and empathy can co-exist in lawkeepers. Lieutenant Abdul Hadi Al Hammadi, an officer at the Rashidiya Police Station, was in the middle of just another work day at the one-day court in August 2018, when a man came to him in tears. It turned out that the man's wife had signed a cheque and couldn't pay the amount. Now, she'd have to cough up Dhs10,000 or face imprisonment.

The man said that the family had only Dhs100 in savings and was unable to raise funds from their relatives. What made things worse was that they had a seven-monthold child who'd be left without a mother if she went to jail.

"Realising that the man had failed to find support from his family and close friends, I decided to help them out," said Al Hammadi.

And he did the unthinkable: the officer decided to pay the woman's fine, so that "she will not be

imprisoned and can go back home with her child and husband". He said, "I asked the husband to wait for some time and spoke about the case to the director of Rashidiya Police Station, Brigadier Saeed Hamad bin Suleiman. After instructions, the fine was paid through and the bill of payment was handed over to the man," said Al Hammadi.

He also insisted that the matter be kept secret, but word got around and, soon, he was being featured in the media. The woman's family was deeply grateful. "When I approached the policeman, everything seemed dark. I couldn't have seen my wife being jailed, with my little baby left alone. I asked the officer to help us, but I never imagined that he'd save my wife by paying the fine," said the husband.

Al Hammadi, incidentally, didn't want to be repaid. "When I paid the fine with my own money, I wasn't thinking of being repaid. I didn't want to hurt the feelings of the woman's husband, so I told him to consider the money as a loan that he could pay back when he could, but I won't accept the money," he said.

POWER OF EMPATHY

Can a soft police officer lead to an increase in crime? The jury is out on this, but an incident involving Sharjah Police demonstrates otherwise. In July 2016, Muneeb Ullah, 33-year-old Pakistani, lost his job and his visa expired. He stayed on in the UAE for a year-and-a-half, violating the country's residency law, while looking for work and accumulated a fine of Dhs18,000 for overstaying.

In early 2018, he received news from his home country that his 93-year-old father had been admitted to the Intensive Care Unit of a hospital with partial paralysis. Ullah had not seen his father for four years and this might be his last chance to meet his ill father. Totally broken down, he went to Al Buhairah Police Station and told the officers about his problems.

Sharjah Police, in cooperation with the Sharjah Foreign Affairs and Residency Department, reduced his fine from Dhs18,000 to Dhs2,000 and allowed him to travel to his home country, where he was able to see his father.

"There are no words to thank Sharjah Police and Sharjah Foreign Affairs and Residency Department for their kindness and generosity," said Ullah. Today, he and his wife have managed to pay their fines and reclaim normal life. So, kindness can be more effective in keeping a person on the right path.

Barely had 2019 begun, when Dubai Police received an urgent message from the airport. A passenger had left a precious ring in the seat pocket of the plane she had flown in. The business-class passenger was transiting through Dubai and had decided to go shopping in the airport, when she remembered the ring — it was worth Dhs550,000. The police swung into action and the ring was returned to the woman just as she was about to board her next flight at Airport Terminal 3.

NAMED AFTER A NATION

While big companies and institutions marked 2018 as the 'Year of Zayed' through grand initiatives, a small gesture touched many hearts. A member of Dubai Police, to display his appreciation for the UAE, named his newborn girl Emarat – she was born in October 2018.

"Naming my daughter after this beautiful country was the least that I could do to show my gratitude. My daughter, Emarat, the third generation of my family, will continue to be inspired by the values of the late Sheikh Zayed, the founding father. I'm proud to have been born, raised and educated in the UAE, which hosts and accommodates over 200 nationalities," said Abdulrahman Taher Ahmed, a Dubai Police staff. UAE POLICE ACHIEVEMENTS

A police officer's job is amongst the toughest in the world. As of May 2018, the UAE had accomplished 97 per cent of the target of UAE 2021 Vision regarding a safe and secure country.

The Ministry of Interior announced that it had achieved its national agenda indicators, including controlling the crime rate and road accidents per 100,000 population. This took relentless hard work, dedication and commitment of the police officers and patrols who worked through foggy days, cracked cyber-crimes, conducted drug busts, and kept the raids and indoors safe. Here are a few recent achievements:

- Abu Dhabi, for the second consecutive year, emerged as the safest city in the world in September 2018, according to Numbeo, a website that curates and collates usercontributed data.
- Dubai's serious crimes index has dropped by 38 per cent from 2013 to 2017.
- In Sharjah, the rate of serious crimes fell by 45 per cent in 2017 and the crime rate dropped by 7.37 per cent compared to 2016.

LAND OF COMPASSION

The actions of the police force can be looked at through the prism of the values that form the UAE's legacy, one that it inherited from its founding father, the late Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan. The first president lived by the virtue of selfless generosity and ensured that unity, compassion, and cooperation were the founding blocks of the country.

In December 2018, to mark the conclusion of the 'Year of Zayed', Ajman Police wrote the world's biggest letter to Sheikh Zayed and it was carried across all the country on a large truck.

"Sheikh Zayed was a man of love and compassion. THE FIFTY-YEAR CHARTER

Launching the charter in January 2019, HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum said, "This document represents our pledge and promise, on behalf of myself and the ruling family of Dubai, of what we will undertake to improve the quality of life, develop the community of Dubai and ensure the future of generations to come."

The pledges, which will be updated every year on January 4, are split up into nine articles that identify specific goals the emirate expects to achieve.

THE FOLLOWING ARE THE NINE ARTICLES:

- 1. DUBAI SILK ROAD: Dubai is destined to be the crossroads between East and West, and between North and South. We have the largest international airport in the world. It connects us with more than 200 cities. Over the next 10 years, more than one billion passengers will pass through our airports. Worldwide, we operate around 80 ports that are connected to hundreds of cities. Our next goal is to build our own Silk Road in cooperation with our friendly neighbours who share our vision. Our region has historically been a region of civilisation and trade, and this role must be restored. We will seek to build international cooperation to support these aspirations.
- 2. A GEO-ECONOMIC MAP FOR DUBAI:
 In the coming phase, we will work to
 develop a geo-economic map for the
 city of Dubai and set up specialised,
 integrated economic zones in the
 whole city. Each geo-economic sector
 in the city will have its own council,
 which manages and markets it. Each
 geographical sector will have its own

economic and investment goals. We will monitor the achievement of these goals with transparency. A Governor will be appointed for each economic zone to oversee the achievement of its goals, as well as its progress and success.

- 3. SETTING UP THE FIRST VIRTUAL COMMERCIAL CITY: Dubai will lead the establishment of the first virtual commercial city in the region that grants commercial licences without having to reside in Dubai. The city will allow investors to open bank accounts and grant e-residencies according to best international laws and regulations. We aim to have 100,000 companies in the virtual city.
- 4. A CENTRAL EDUCATION FILE FOR **EVERY CITIZEN:** We aim to develop a centralised education database for every citizen to document all the academic degrees obtained, classes and training taken, and conferences attended. This will help us design customised educational plans for our citizens that suit their personal skills. We aim to build an educational and learning system that explores and develops people's skills. Our goal for our citizens is to have life-long learning so they can continue to improve their skills and capacities to adapt to the rapid global changes in the world.
- 5. DOCTOR FOR EVERY CITIZEN: We aim to provide citizens with medical consultations 24/7 through hundreds of thousands of doctors, specialists and medical consultants across the globe. This will be facilitated by smart government application. Our goal is to transform the medical system to bring doctors closer to individuals, enhance awareness, and utilise top medical minds globally to serve the health of our citizens.
- 6. FREE ECONOMIC AND CREATIVE ZONES IN UNIVERSITIES: Dubai's foundation is rooted in trade. We will announce our public and private

universities as free zones that allow students to carry out business and creative activities, make these activities part of the education and graduation system, and shape integrated economic and creative zones around the universities. These zones will support students with education, research and funding during the launch of their projects. We want our universities to not only graduate students but also create companies and employers.

- 7. SELF-SUFFICIENCY IN DUBAI
 HOMES: We will develop an
 integrated programme to build a
 comprehensive system that allows at
 least a tenth of our citizens' homes
 to be self-sufficient in terms of water,
 food and energy. The achievement
 of this goal will help change lifestyles
 and contribute to the preservation
 of our environment. We aim to
 create a new economic sector that
 supports energy, water and food selfsufficiency in the houses of Dubai, for
- 8. COOPERATIVE COMPANIES IN

 VARIOUS SECTORS: This is a longterm programme that aims to provide
 new sources of income to our citizens,
 improve the quality of some services
 through privatisation, and establishes
 cooperative companies owned by
 citizens in a number of vital sectors.

9. ANNUAL GROWTH IN PHILANTHROPY: Our daily businesses and projects should not let us forget about giving to those who need help. We pledge to increase philanthropic initiatives every year and grow them by at least an equal percentage of our annual economic growth. Charity is indeed a major factor in the happiness of societies and the continuity of progress and prosperity.

A new Charter shall be launched on January 4 every year to sustain the welfare and happiness of society.



8-POINT PLAN

HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum also laid out a road map for the future success of the UAE in an eight-point plan. I renounce unfair practice or conduct of any person, and the ruling family shall likewise renounce any form of injustice as long as it governs the

- 4. Three factors drive growth: Dubai's growth is driven by three factors: a credible, resilient and excellent government; an active, fair and open private sector; and public and government-owned flagship companies that compete globally, and generate an income for the government, jobs for its citizens, and assets for future generations.
- 5. Our society has a unique personality:

 Our society is a respectful and coherent one, bound by tolerance and openness. It distances itself from all forms of discrimination and bias. It is a disciplined society, committed to its promises, timelines and covenants. We are modest about our successes, perseverant in dealing with challenges, charitable and generous in achieving the greater good, and open to everyone.
- 6. We believe in economic diversification: Economic diversification: Economic diversification has been the foundation of our unwritten constitution in Dubai since 1833. The changing times and the rapid developments make our commitment to this principle everlasting. Our new goal is to create at least a new economic sector every three years that will be productive, contribute to our GDP, and generate jobs.
- 7. A land for talent: Dubai has always relied on talented tradesmen, administrators, engineers, creatives, and dreamers for its success. The emirate's prominence, sustainability and competitiveness depend on its capacity to continue attracting skilled and talented people, and nurturing the brightest minds to generate innovative ideas. We have to continually review and renew our policies and procedures

to ensure our appeal to talented individuals. We must build the best environment in Dubai for the world's leading minds.

8. We care about future generations: The destiny of our future generations must not be affected by the fluctuations of regional politics and global economic cycles. We invest and create valuable assets for them. Our fundamental rule in this regard is that the government should, under all circumstances, own economic assets that are worth at least 20 times the value of its annual budget. We work towards maintaining a secure future, and we are focused today on ensuring the prosperity of our future generations. These are the eight principles for governing in Dubai that we recommend to ourselves and to those who will succeed us. We call on future generations to preserve these principles and hand them down to those who succeed them. God Almighty knows well our intentions to ensure the greater good of our people. We pray

to Him to help us serve our country and our people with pride and dignity.

10 COMMANDMENTS OF GOVERNANCE

- 4. MONITOR YOURSELF: Monitor the performance in your institution. Have an inspector inside and a neutral one outside. Indicators are necessary because they ensure you are on the right path.
- 5. MAKE YOUR WORK TEAM: Don't fly, sing or applaud alone. Make a team that carries your targets to new levels, give up some authority for them and raise their ambitions higher.
- 6. INNOVATE OR WITHDRAW:

Governments that don't innovate grow old. With ideas, we will beat all competitors. New economy is based on innovations. Nothing is stronger than great ideas.

7. COMMUNICATE: Tell the world about your ambitions. With media, you can get public support. Announce your

goals through the media because they will hold you accountable.

- 8. ALWAYS HAVE COMPETITION: Compete with yourself or others, and create a competitive working atmosphere. Competition should be a lifestyle in governments. Without it, enthusiasm and courage would disappear.
- 9. CREATE LEADERS: Making leaders is a secret that is only understood by men who beat their egos and recognise that the greatest achievement is to build a human being, not bricks.
- 10. CHANGE LIVES: We are lucky because we work in governments, our job is the best thing in our life; it is our life. With it, we change the lives of millions for the better.

A NEW STREAMING FILM HAS NOT ONLY GOT MILLIONS OF VIEWS, BUT HAS ALSO SPAWNED A DANGEROUS VIRAL TREND -DOING THINGS WITH A BLINDFOLD ON

ife imitates art. And that comes with consequences. In a video that went viral in January 2019, a man holds two children – one by each hand – and runs to the opposite side of the room, towards a door. He and the older child pass through the door, but the second child, a toddler, hits the wall. The video ends with the toddler struggling to remove the blindfold.

What this man was trying out was the Bird Box Challenge, one of those dozens of viral challenges that we keep hearing about, only more dangerous than many others. Across the world, it has become cool to post videos of oneself chopping vegetables, stumbling around houses, forests, and neighbourhoods, shopping – and even driving – with the blindfold on. People are injuring themselves by walking into obstacles or getting dangerously close to traffic. Others have gone 24 hours blindfolded, and documented it all. All in the name of fun.

At the heart of these baffling adventures is a streaming film, titled Bird Box. The Netflix-produced a thriller film, based on a 2014 book by Josh Malerman, pivots around a dark force that kills whoever looks at it. The protagonist, Malory (Sandra Bullock), must negotiate rough terrain, forest, and a wild river to take two children to safety while people die all around them. The only way for them to stay safe is to keep their eyes shut and ears open. Malory and the children, named Boy and Girl, keep their blindfolds on whenever they are outdoors, even when they're running for their lives.

The film released on December 21, 2018, and, in a couple of days, broke viewing

records all over the world. Even as it grabbed eyeballs, Bird Box spawned a hashtag and fans began to fill it with their own inspired mini-films of going blindfolded while carrying out their regular activities.

RED FLAG

Reports of injuries soon began to swirl around the Internet, and Netflix itself tweeted a warning: "Can't believe I have to say this, but please do not hurt yourselves with this Bird Box Challenge. We don't know how this started, and we appreciate the love, but Boy and Girl have just one wish for 2019 and it is that you not end up in hospital due to memes."

Not that everybody was impressed by the videos. One user expressed the view: "Does anyone else find the #BirdBoxChallenge a little insensitive to the millions of people who are literally blind and are actually able to live normal lives without vision?" In the UAE, there has been no recorded instance of the Bird Box Challenge, indicating a more responsible attitude amongst the populace.

VIRAL FEVER

In the UAE, there has been no case of this challenge thanks to the constant awareness efforts of the Ministry of Interior, all the General Police Commands as well as various institutions in all segments of society, under the guidance and follow-up of HH Sheikh Saif bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior, says Jamal Al Ameri, traffic expert and Executive Director of SAEED Society to Reduce Traffic Accidents in the UAE, to 999. Amongst other reasons, adds Al Ameri, is that the UAE has a progressive traffic strategy and conducts continuous campaigns on traffic rules and law awareness. "With these awareness campaign and initiatives, we are countering the impact of these 'challenges' on the Internet that could endanger participants. We create a shield against any irresponsible hurdles and hiccups that may have come from any part of the world," he says. Why do these challenges go viral, despite the clear risks? Because in the real world, most people are invisible to most others, but on the Internet, everybody can be a star, even if for just a few days.

"The Internet plays a major role in shaping the minds of young people today," says Sarah El Nabulsi, Clinical Psychologist, Dubai Healthcare City, speaking to **999**. "They're now connected to a global community that holds its own values and traits that the youth perceive as valuable. These values might directly conflict with the ones held by the young person's own country. The problem is: this young person will be more pulled

or attracted by what's perceived as 'cool' by his peers; the Internet community not his parents.

They want to belong to the 'cool' group.

"The explanation of this from a developmental perspective is that they're at an age where they're intrinsically motivated to appeal to their friends and place themselves high in that group's hierarchy. We all know what's valued for young people in the online community – beauty, wealth regardless of the means, substances, and risky behaviours."

WORDS OF CAUTION

Al Ameri adds that UAE residents must remember the strategy of the UAE Federal Government when dealing with the challenges on social networking sites such as the Bird Box Challenge. "We must abide by its laws. We do not want any other cases of residents abusing the power of social media platforms. The words of His Highness Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Nahyan, Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi and Deputy Supreme Commander of the UAE Armed Forces, should be our guide in preserving the name of the UAE in the world," he says.

LOOK BEFORE YOU LEAP

Bundled up in dark jackets against the cold, four blindfolded friends walk on a pavement in a city famous for its edgy lifestyle. One in the group runs ahead and turns the corner at full throttle. The camera follows him to the subway and pans the steps leading down. And there, on the landing, the man is splayed where he fell with full force. Painful doesn't begin to describe it, especially in the cold.





PREDICTABLE RESULT WHEN DRIVING WITH BLINDFOLDS ON



A 17-year-old girl in Layton, Utah in the USA caused a two-car crash after pulling a beanie over her eyes as part of the Bird Box Challenge. She lost control of her car which

smashed into another driver, a light pole and a sound barrier. The girl, a 16-year-old passenger and the other driver sustained injuries in the crash. Police had recommended the driver face a charge of reckless driving. Layton Police tweeted photos of the crash, with the caption: "Bird Box Challenge while driving, predictable result. This happened as a result of the driver covering her eyes while driving on Layton Parkway." Police only began

suspecting the Bird Box challenge had been the cause of the accident after the driver she hit asked for surveillance footage and shared his findings with officers.



DON'T STEER THE WHEEL WHEN YOU CANT SEE

A YouTube star, whose biggest fans are aged between eight and 16 years, appears to have carried out his regular activities for 24 hours in early January 2019 while blindfolded. This includes driving a large car around an estate and right through garbage bins placed on the pavement. "I hate this challenge," he screams. In a shocking sequence, the car speeds across the winding road as the camera gives a glimpse of the social media star turning the steering wheel, a black cloth covering both eyes. He follows this up with a sequence in which he and a companion cross a road, still in blindfold, as cars speed past.





RISE TO THE REAL CHALLENGE

Here are some of the positive challenges that make news in the UAE:



The Arab Reading Challenge: The brainchild of His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, the Arab Reading Challenge is the largest ever Arab literary initiative. It's meant to encourage students to read as many books as possible in one academic year. The challenge of 2018 was taken by 10.5 million participants from 44 countries across the Arab region and was won by the youngest of the five finalists, nineyear-old Mariam Lehsen Amjoun from Morocco.

The 2018 challenge was held between October 26 and November 24.

Spinneys Dubai 92 Cycle Challenge: Around 2,000 cyclists took over the roads as the biggest cycling event of the Middle East turned nine in December 2018. Sure, the cyclists were about grit, determination and speed but, most important, the participants displayed a spirit of sportsmanship and cooperation. The event has the support of the authorities.









HGEM Innovation Challenge: Launched in 2019, this is the first high school innovation challenge and features a sprint-like competition. Multi-disciplinary teams coordinate with one another, coming up with solutions in a very limited time. This is an initiative of the Harvard Undergraduate Global Education Movement, in partnership with Harvard Club of the UAE, the Knowledge and Human Development Authority in Dubai, and the Ismaili Centre Dubai. One of the focus areas of the event is to "provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate their intellectual creativity in a results-driven competition". The event will be held from March 14 to 16, 2019.



Abu Dhabi Desert Challenge: The event calls out to some of the biggest names in international motorsport to tackle the dunes of the UAE. Amongst the world's most prestigious desert rallies, it has witnessed the participation of names such as Carlos Sainz, Colin McRae, Ari Vatenan, and Heinz Kinigadner. This year, the challenge will take place from March 31 to April 4, and registration is open at reduced rates until February 8, 2019.



THE GOOD, THE BAD, AND THE UGLY

Some bizarre challenges that took over the world:


Kiki Challenge: Cutting across national borders, age and celebrity status, people rose to the #KikiChallenge in mid-2018 by dancing to singer Drake's song, In My Feelings, while – and this is the dangerous bit - on the road, alongside a moving car. The

challenge required participants to get out of a moving car, leave the door open, and move their bodies in rhythm to song as the car continued to drive onward. In July 2018, three social media influencers in the UAE were arrested for doing the Kiki dance. The Abu Dhabi public prosecution issued a statement saying the Kiki Challenge was "offending public morals" and endangering lives. The penalty was imprisonment or a fine under the Federal Penal Code and Law No. 21 of 1995 regarding traffic law.

> Falling Stars Challenge: It's no fun being rich if you can't flaunt it. Around October 2018, a viral sensation took over Instagram and Weibo in which super-wealthy youngsters were sprawled on the ground in front of their swanky cars or private jets -

as if they stumbled while getting out – and their super-luxury items were spread around them, as if these, too, accidentally fell out of their bags.

Chubby Bunny Challenge: A challenge that goes back to the pre-Internet era, it resurfaced in 2018 when people began to put up videos of themselves stuffing their mouths with marshmallows and then saying, "Chubby Bunny." The game remains popular, though people are aware that there have been instances of choking and death, including that of a little girl in 1999 when she put four marshmallows in her mouth and collapsed.



Momo Challenge: Cyberbullying expanded to a viral sensation when mobile users in various parts of the world began to receive graphic threats from a user named Momo. Momo wanted the recipient of the messages St. John's County Sheriff's to perform a series of dangerous tasks
Office Facebook a challenge similar to the deadly

Blue Whale, in which many youngsters self-harmed and died. Those who refused were threatened and sent gory images. The Momo Challenge gained worldwide notoriety in July 2018.

ear friends, we are truly blessed. We are, indeed, fortunate to live in the golden age of the world wide web, an amazing innovation into the thrall of which today's children have been thrust and know no different.

"Hmmm," I hear you say. "Where have I read these lines before?" Why, dear astute reader, this very column began last month with exactly the same paragraph. No apologies for repetition, for it is just as relevant, if not more so this time around.

Yes, of course, the computer age, the Internet, social media et al have significantly changed our lives, and in so many ways, changed the way we do things for the better. However, the benefits are balanced somewhat by the inevitable negative consequences of our virtual interplay.

One of the latest crazes to hit the web emanates from a 2018 movie, titled Bird Box, as a result of which social media

followers pick up on a 'meme' that encourages participation in what could be described as a 'dare' or a challenge.

The storyline for the movie revolves around this: "When a mysterious force decimates the population only one thing is certain – you see it – you die."

Thus, the actors are forced to wear blindfolds in case their eyes should alight because of this force. They are, to all intents and purposes, blind from that point onwards. The movie, no doubt, weaves a fascinating plot around the travails of the characters whilst encumbered by the loss of the great gift of sight.

The spin-off is that it seems someone saw the movie and had the idea that it might be fun to try and carry out some tasks

while blindfolded. A little like a parlour game for those of us who can remember it. Harmless fun? Well, yes it could be, for example, applying a luscious lip gloss without being able to follow the application in a mirror. You would probably finish up

with an extra mouth, or a bright red moustache.

But there are countless examples of reckless behaviour, driven by the desire of 'Bird Boxers' to trump the crazy stunts of their peers. One can imagine scarily dangerous challenges such as walking around on top of a high-rise – blindfolded. Or how about this one that has actually happened and is well-documented (and videoed) on the web: A man driving a car on public streets while blindfolded.

It's accepted that before the advent of easy instant global communication, there were bizarre fads, phases, crazes, challenges, and dares. But isn't it so that they took such a long time to

spread that they either lost impetus and tailed off, or were replaced by something new before they could escalate into this huge, uncontrollable chaos?

The movie's distributor recognises the potential danger of the meme their production has spawned, and the Market Watch website also carries the following: "Taking to Twitter in a bid to stop the movie's fans from running into problems, a representative wrote: "Can't believe I have to say this, but: Please do not hurt yourselves with this bird box challenge."

Hopefully with such a big name behind the cautionary advice, it may have some impact.

Have fun, life is too short to miss, but don't make it any shorter – look before you leap, and keep your eyes open.

he phrase 'renewable energy', referring to a sustainable alternative to fossil fuels, is the buzzword in an era where the effects of global warming are felt across the planet. However, its limitless potential isn't being realised at the rate that Mother Earth needs — we're still reading about coral reefs dving, polar ice disappearing, extreme weather events increasing in fury and frequency. Climate change is the most fearsome phenomenon on the planet, and the human race is both responsible for it and has the ability to mitigate it. This is where the UAE comes in. In the region, it has taken the lead to explore renewable resources such as wind, water, solar, or bio-fuel in order to reach a sustainable future and borrow more time to preserve the world for future generations.

As more and more economies constantly look for a dramatic shift in energy use, trying to include more alternative sources in the mix, the UAE is initiating a global industry platform that connects countries, businesses, and clean and efficient technologies through the World Future Energy Summit (WFES). This year's edition of the expo. which was held last month. saw more than 850 international exhibitors from across all continents who gathered in the Capital to showcase the latest green solutions to reduce the carbon footprint of human civilisation. WFES is a key component of the Abu Dhabi Sustainability Week (ADSW).

UAE PIONEERS SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT FOR ALL

Over the past century, no one has really invented a major revolutionary technology in terms of transportation, until the UAE recently zoomed through the use of an amazing technology called the Hyperloop. With the rollout of this mode of transportation, not only will road accidents be curbed, in line with the UAE National Agenda 2021's Sustainable Environment and Infrastructure goal of making this country the world's safest nation, it also aims to make the UAE one of the pioneers in terms of green mode of transportation, as it has no direct carbon emission. It's designed to be an energy-efficient pod that will travel from origin to destination at a speed of up to 1.230km/hr. Its creators see it as one of the most innovative modes of transportation in a hundred years, travelling via electric propulsion using magnetic means compared with conventional chemical thrusters.

As per a recent research by Scania Middle East, carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions can be lowered by more than 20 per cent by optimising transport systems, which in turn can contribute to meeting the goals set by the National Agenda 2021.

stressed that the intelligent transport sector has become a pivotal part of the economy of the future, an important pillar of sustainable development and a central element in achieving its objectives. With the Hyperloop onboard, the UAE is making the rise of renewable energy in the region a reality - the far-fetched dream of green mobility is being fast-tracked at an unprecedented pace. And by next year, 2020, it's all systems go for the Hyperloop in the UAE. This was announced in January by the Dubai Media Office. The transport system aims to cut travel time from Dubai to Abu Dhabi and vice versa from more than 90 minutes to just 12 minutes. That's what imagination does - it makes the unthinkable viable.

THE FACE OF RENEWABLES IN THE REGION

Changing the perception of the Middle East as a hydrocarbon region, HE Dr Thani bin Ahmed Al Zeyoudi, Minister of Climate Change and Environment, underscored that the region now has the cheapest source of power in the GCC region. "The UAE set the region's first renewable energy targets amidst widespread doubt about its viability and value. Today, renewable energy is the cheapest source of power in the GCC region - cheaper than oil, gas and nuclear options. Ten years later, we increased our clean







energy target to 27 percent by 2021," the Minister said.

It might be true that the Middle East is a late bloomer in terms of utilising the use of renewable resources, but, as per Tim Armsby, Regional Head of Energy and Infrastructure of Pinsent Masons—an international law firm that specialises in the energy and infrastructure, the region is taking a ride in the wind by benefiting from coming late to the game.

"Now a number of Middle East countries are looking to roll out solar plants because the costs are too cheap to ignore," Armsby said. Adding to this, many companies have set up in the UAE and other countries to take advantage of Saudi Arabia's renewable energy programme. The kingdom is now pushing to go green with two projects tendered in 2017 – a large 300MW solar project and a 400MW wind farm.

There's potential for battery storage in the region. However, as of now, there is insufficient capacity in the market to encourage innovation. For Armsby, he said that, "The Middle East could play a lead and build the expertise and technology to be able to export that elsewhere globally, because there is clearly a niche for it."

To look into this, the UAE's clean energy company Masdar has collaborated with Norway's Equinor to analyse data from the Batwind battery system for energy storage generated by the Hywind Scotland Floating wind farm. The parties will purchase, test and install Batwind to investigate how the battery storage solution can be leveraged to improve the operational and cost efficiency of offshore wind farms.

Bader Al Lamki, Masdar's Executive
Director for Clean Energy, said, "By
partnering with Equinor on the Batwind
project, Masdar is addressing this critical
need for affordable, reliable and regionallyoptimised battery technologies and
strengthening the viability of energy storage
solutions. This has the potential to deliver

BRIDGING SUSTAINABILITY GAP

Quoting Mahatma Gandhi in his address to a gathering of global and national leaders, he said, "It is easier to bridge the oceans that lie between continents than it is to bridge the gap between individuals. I commend you for coming to the Abu Dhabi Sustainability Week 2019 to work for a common goal preservation of planet earth."

The UAE takes its sustainability goals very seriously, according to HE Eng Awaidha Murshed Al Marar, Chairman of the Department of Energy and member of the Executive Council. "We have placed our natural resources at the centre of our wider plans, and today, we are better prepared


ENERGY TRANSITION IMPACTS ECONOMY

Many world leaders and international experts in the economic sectors agree that alternative sources of energy are viable solutions to lift millions of people across the globe out of poverty. Adnan Z Amin, member of the Global Energy Prize International Award Committee, and Director General of the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA), highlighted at a special panel session within the WFES 2019 that the decarbonisation and climate mitigation goals set out in the Paris Agreement can be considered as a process of global energy transition. "Renewables must account for at least two-thirds of total energy to achieve the goals of deep decarbonisation and address the global warming by 2050," he said.

"The ongoing transition to renewables is not only just a shift from one set of fossil fuels to another. It involves a much deeper transformation of the world's energy system that will have major social, economic and political implications, which go well beyond the energy sector. The term 'energy transition' captures this broader implication," Adnan further explained.

"Today renewable energy technologies are viewed not only as tools for improving energy security, mitigating, and adapting to climate change but are also increasingly recognised as investments that can provide direct and indirect economic advantages," he added.

According to IRENA's report, increasing energy system investment in alternative energy by 30 per cent to 2050 can create 11 million additional energy sector jobs. And by then, natural gas would be the largest source of fossil fuel, which would spur one per cent growth in the global economy. Moreover, benefits not captured by GDP (gross domestic product), such as health benefits from reduced air pollution and reduced climate impacts, amongst others, would improve by 15 per cent, compared to the current trajectory.

UAE EMPOWERS GRASSROOTS THROUGH FUNDS

In this regard, the UAE has been allotting more of its overseas development funds for cleaner sources of energy projects in many parts of the world that need access to efficient energy sources and are looking to improve their economies.

The Abu Dhabi Fund for Development (ADFD) and IRENA are inviting applications for renewable energy plans in developing countries to breathe life into their projects with more than \$50 million (Dhs183.7mn) in funding through the IRENA/ADFD Project Facility.

Moreover, ADFD has committed \$350mn

"Renewable energy can have a powerful impact on the livelihoods of people across the globe," said IRENA Director-General Amin, adding that, "It is the most cost-competitive option to expand access to energy and improve socioeconomic welfare while creating jobs and empowering local communities."

SMALL CHILDREN FALLING OFF BUILDINGS HAVE LEFT MANY BEREAVED FAMILIES. PARENTS AND GUARDIANS MUST NOT LET THEIR GUARD DOWN TO SHIELD KIDS FROM SUCH TRAGEDIES. 999 OUTLINES THE PROBLEM AND ITS SOLUTIONS

ig cities with higher population density have a skyline of tall buildings. Many of them are residential apartment blocks. While these buildings must afford nice views, parents must always look after their kids and make sure that they will never have an access to dangerous spots in apartment buildings or flats, like balconies and windows.

Fall-related child fatalities and nonfatal injuries happen globally, and the UAE is no exception. In several cases, the parents have to be held accountable for their inattention. It has become a social and security issue that weighs on the authorities' mind. With these accidents making headlines every now and then, some parents have also become apprehensive and are trying to minimise the risk.

"It was the fear of living in a high-rise with our young child that made us opt for a low-rise building," said Natasha, mother to an eight-year-old girl. She recalled that when her daughter was a toddler, the family passed up the chance to stay in the rather desirable apartment. "Though we had narrowed our then available options down to an apartment on the 20th floor of a high-rise tower that had beautiful views of the Arabian sea, we decided to sacrifice the view for the safety of our child, who had then just turned three."

She added that even now, despite not living in a high-rise and though

her daughter is now older, the family remained cautious. "We continue to stay in this mid-rise building, which is far safer for my kid. But, we still ensure that our living room and bedroom windows are locked properly at all times. In fact, we installed hook and eye safety locks for extra security," said Natasha.

Mariam, a mother of two boys and an 18-month-old girl, opted to rent an apartment without a balcony on the 10th floor of a tower block in the Capital. She was concerned that her very young children might become too curious about the outside world, and climb on to the balcony parapet. She said, "I have three kids, all of them are below five years old. They're quite eager to know about their surroundings, and the three of them often stand near the window to look out. We had thought about this before and as a precaution, we chose to take an


apartment without a balcony. Though we don't have the Corniche view, we still take our kids for a stroll."

PARENTS, PAY ATTENTION

In September 2018, a four-yearold Arab boy fell to his death from his apartment's balcony in Ajman. "The boy was playing with his tablet on the balcony, when he climbed a railing, lost his balance and fell to his death," according to Lt Colonel Ghaith Khalifa Al Kaabi, head of the Nuaimiya Comprehensive Police Department.

A month earlier, a five-year-old girl died after falling from the 24th floor of a building in Sharjah. She was climbing on furniture just before the accident happened. In May, a 10-year-old Arab girl fell to her death from the balcony of her family's 5th floor flat in Ajman. Following initial investigation, the police said that

the girl was alone and unsupervised at home. Her family was out shopping, returned at 3pm, and called the police when they found that the child was missing. The child had, meanwhile, been taken to the hospital after her fall —

passersby had seen her lying motionless on the ground – and the police took the family there to identify the body.

Appealing to parents to ensure that their children would always be under supervision, Lt Colonel Yahya Khalf Al Matroushi, Director-General of Al Hamidyah Police Station, said that the 10-year-old child's case would be referred to the court to ascertain whether or not the parents or guardians were to blame for negligence.

RADICAL SOLUTIONS

As per data released by Sharjah Police, 18 children fell to their deaths from residential towers between 2012 and 2015. Six died in 2016, and three in 2017.

"We're keen to find radical solutions to the problem of accidents involving children in high-rise buildings. This can be done in coordination with government agencies to safeguard the community, which is one of our priorities," said Thabit Al Turaifi, Director General of Sharjah City Municipality.

A Sharjah Municipality presentation showed that negligence by parents, stocking furniture and other objects on Child falls from windows and balconies are preventable. Despite many efforts by UAE authorities to enforce window and balcony safety regulations, falls do occur



balconies and near windows, and leaving windows open were some of the main reasons for children falling off buildings.

In order to check these mishaps, the Sharjah government introduced preventive measures in 2017 and also amended the technical requirements for residential windows and balconies.

The measures included increasing the height of window sills and balcony parapets to 1.2 metres, instead of 1 metre (from the floor); installing safety locks to prevent windows from opening more than 5-10 centimetres wide; using railings that children cannot climb over; and putting up a translucent acrylic barrier on balcony railings after getting municipality permit.

A recent nationwide survey conducted by the Institute of Public Health – College of Medicine and Health Sciences, Al Ain, showed that 81 per cent of the children who've fallen from heights in the UAE have ended up dying, underscoring the need for preventive care.

The survey found that 53 per cent of the falls involved boys with the mean age of 4.9 years – of them, 47 per cent fell from windows; and 44 per cent from balconies. The maximum number of falls were in Sharjah (39), followed by Abu Dhabi (16), Dubai (10), Ajman (nine), Fujairah (four) and Ras Al Khaimah (two), it added.

are preventable. Despite many efforts by UAE authorities to enforce window and balcony safety regulations, falls do occur. There is a challenge with the turnover of the expatriate community, which needs to be constantly educated about safety risks and importance of vigilance," said lead researcher Prof Michal Grivna, Director of the Institute of Public Health - College of Medicine and Health Sciences.

Meanwhile, the American Academy for Pediatrics, in a research on falls from heights, said that there were numerous factors that contribute to fall injuries, ranging from neurological disorders, such as seizures, developmental delay, hyperactivity and parental neglect.

Modern window screens, although easily removable to allow for escape during residential fires, are designed to keep insects out of the house and do not provide a barrier to falls. As the majority of serious injuries are related to falls from windows, the paper suggests using "child safety" window screens made of steel that can withstand 67.5 kilograms of pressure.

The UK-based charity, Child Accident Prevention Trust (CAPT), warns parents to keep low furniture away from windows so that young children can't climb up and fall out - even on the ground floor. "It's a good idea to install window catches (to limit how far they can open) and locks if you can," it advises.

Pre-school children are particularly susceptible to falls from a height, as they're curious and want to see what's happening outside, but have no real understanding of danger, states the Trust. "They can take parents by surprise by a sudden breakthrough in their development. You think they don't climb but, before you know it, they can clamber up on furniture or haul their toy box across the floor and open a window. And accidents can happen very quickly when your back is turned or you're distracted for a minute," said the Trust.

It asked parents to fit window catches, locks or restrictors to stop windows opening too wide. Parents should move furniture away from windows to make it harder for small children to climb up. "Safety equipment like this takes the pressure off you. It's often easy to fit. And you can find safety catches for all types of windows, including metal window frames and double glazing," said Katrina Phillips, Chief Executive of CAPT. "You can also start teaching them where not to climb – though they may forget if there's something interesting outside they really want to see," she said.

DON'T LEAVE THEM ALONE

Codes and regulations cannot prevent falls and accidents involving balconies, windows, railings and terraces. Therefore, awareness of dangers caused by human negligence (parents and quardians) is of high importance, especially in these times of high-rise living and working spaces, according to UAE Fire & Life Safety Code of Practice. So, follow these guidelines:




- · Never leave children, special needs people, mentally challenged, mentally unstable and elderly people unattended and unsupervised at the balconies, near windows, railings and terraces.
- Never keep furniture, bedding, articles or climbable objects near windows, balconies, railings and terraces, which can be translated into a 'ladder' by innocent and unwary children.
- · Always lock access to terraces, balconies, railings and window panes when children, special needs people,

- opening more than 6.5 centimetres; this will stop children being able to squeeze through.

BONDS BETWEEN NATIONS

The Community Police Department in the Community Security Sector of Abu Dhabi Police organised a set of events that focused on offering advice and assistance to tourists.

Colonel Dr Hamoud Saeed Al Afari, Director of the Community Police Department of Abu Dhabi Police, underscored the importance of providing tourism security in keeping with the best international standards, thus attracting more tourists from various countries.

"The activities and events concentrate on educating tourists on the prevalent culture in Emirati society, acquainting tourists with their rights and duties in several languages, as well as spreading awareness amongst the public to acquaint them with the significance of safe tourism. VIOLATIONS AND CRIMES

As regards the violations and crimes that tourists might commit in Abu Dhabi and in the UAE, Major Rashid Mohammad Al Muhairi, Head of Tourism Police section of Abu Dhabi Police, stressed that educating the tourists would make it clear to them which acts are prohibited and what penalties will be imposed for committing such acts. This will keep the tourists from inadvertently violating the law and facing fines.

Major Al Muhairi added that the brochures and leaflets distributed to travellers at all points of entry explain amongst tourist to carry identification documents or cards at all times. Visitors are also asked to lock their vehicles and keep their valuable possessions away from the view of other people. Other pieces of information in between its covers are tips on selecting beaches visited by

the public and with lifeguard services, while avoiding remote beaches, and wearing modest attire in public places.

The leaflets focused on prohibitions that UAE law penalise.

- **1.** Trespassing or taking photographs of prohibited areas
- **2.** Possessing narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances
- 3. Practising sexual exploitation
- 4. Engaging in begging

Travellers are also asked to refrain from actions not in line with good public manners, and to avoid eating, drinking, and smoking in public during daytime in the month of Ramadan. Colonel Al Mazroui called upon tourists to comply with the laws and regulations of the UAE, to respect local customs and traditions, and to avoid uncivilised behaviour, so that everyone can enjoy their time in the UAE.

BAIT OF BOGUS CAS PRIZES

ALL KINDS OF SCAMMERS ARE OUT THERE TO TAKE YOUR MONEY - AND SOMETIMES, THE SCAM STARTS WITH AN OFFER OF BIG MONEY. 999 EXPLAINS HOW NOT TO FALL FOR THE BAIT

very week, Rameez (real name withheld) is on the verge of becoming a dollar millionaire. The weekly e-mail announces his name as the winner, merely asking him to transfer a certain amount as processing fee and then wait for a big pot of cash to arrive in his bank account.

"When I first got this e-mail, I read it thoroughly and realised it was nothing more than a scam. I didn't respond at all and simply hit the delete button," said Rameez, a sales executive, who has been working in the UAE for the past two years.

A variation of this scam is the text message informing a person that they've won a million dollars or million pounds in a lottery of mobile phone numbers. Absurd though this sounds why would there be a mobile number lottery, anyway? Still, people do fall for it, despite the awareness campaigns by law enforcement.

As recently as in November 2018, there was a report of how a woman had been fooled into transferring Dhs42,000 to a bank account with the promise of a big cash prize. In October 2018, a man was conned into paying Dhs10,000 as "processing fee" for a million-dollar "prize".

In December 2018, it was also reported in UAE media that scammers were targeting genuine lottery ticket buyers. These were people who had bought tickets, hoping to win at big lotteries. So, if they got a call saying they had won the top prize, it wouldn't be so surprising, would it? That's

to exploit. The modus operandi, as the reports warned, is to tell the ticket holders that they had won, then ask for bank details etc, and then ask for that inevitable "processing fee".

Scammers keep getting more creative. People can block e-mails from suspicious IDs, but there's no stopping the flood of text messages.

"I've blocked a number of e-mail IDs, but now I often get text messages about winning a lottery or an overseas holiday. The sender asks me to contact him and share all my personal details to be able to process and release my prize. Once again, I delete these messages and block the sender," said Rameez.

Sometimes, instead of directly sending a scam message, a fraudster might try to gain the target's confidence. Dubai resident Jasmine, who hails from the Philippines, is quite active on social media and keeps getting friendship messages from strangers. She said, "Once I accepted the friendship request from a stranger, and he started sending me messages that I was a lucky winner and he wanted to transfer money to my account. He asked me to share my bank details, but requested a small online fee. I could sense something was wrong and so have blocked him."

With increasing Internet use around the world, scams have been increasing, too, and they don't stop at geographical borders. The UAE is no exception. Gullible individuals are being hoodwinked despite the

government authorities and private companies frequently issuing warnings and advisories.

The Dubai Police issued a warning in June 2018 against phone scammers after a rise in the number of fraud cases that costed some residents hundreds of thousands of dirhams. "People in Dubai and a nearby emirate were conned out of about Dh780,000 over the past five months by conmen who convinced them that they had won large cash prizes. Since the gang lived in a nearby place, we coordinated with the police officers there and then raided their house," said Brigadier Saeed Hamad bin Sulaiman, Director of Rashidiya Police Station, revealed that 33 fraudsters were arrested from April to May that year for tricking residents into transferring money as fees for awards they believed they had won. "The members of these gangs speak different languages. If the person who answers the phone speaks Arabic, he will respond using the same language," he said.

Meanwhile, Colonel Omar Mohammad bin Hammad, Deputy Director of the Anti-Economic Crime Department at Dubai Police, advised residents to call 901 and provide the mobile number of such con artists so they could be tracked down. "Even if a person wasn't duped by them, he or she should call 901 and provide us with the number so

we can arrest the culprits. Members of the public should be more aware of the scam. It is hard to believe that someone will win this kind of money so easily," Col Bin Hammad said.

In December, Ajman Police announced on their Instagram page that they had arrested a 19-member gang of Asians, who were scamming residents through the bait of bogus

enticing people with prize money of Dhs200,000, supposedly "won from a telecommunications company", but also asking for a fee to be transferred online and details of the so-called winner's bank account number, said Mohammed Hamad bin Yafour Al Ghafli, Deputy Director of the Criminal Investigations Department at Ajman Police.

PROTECT YOUR INFO

Al Ghafli urged the public to be wary of such scams, insisting that personal information, such as bank account details, had to be kept private at all times.

In January this year, the scam that was reported tried to get that kind of personal information out of targets. Fake job offers, sent via e-mail, SMS, or a WhatsApp message, dangled the carrot of ludicrously high salaries and tried to get users to click on a link for "further information".

In response, the Telecommunications Regulatory Authority (TRA) cautioned the public: "If one clicks the link in the message, it would give away the personal information of the user. Interacting with such messages could result in your WhatsApp account being stolen."

Khalid Al Hamrani, Partner and Head of Financial Crime at Al Tamimi & Co., explained the layman's understanding of fraud. He said that it is an offence that involves deception; however, the

elements of the crime are more nuanced. "The act of fraud, under UAE law, is the act of acquiring or receiving, through fraudulent means, money, moveable goods, or immoveable real property that is owned by another person. Those means, to be fraudulent, have to convince the victim to surrender the money, goods, or property to the offender," Al Hamrani said. He added that: "While deception is a necessary aspect of fraud, it is not sufficient in and of itself to establish the offence. Fraud is only considered to have occurred when the act has involved both deceit and the use of fraudulent means to obtain property or assets."

Meanwhile, Omar Khodeir, Senior Associate at Al Tamimi, said that the Cyber Law is the main law of the land which tackles crimes occurring through the Internet or online platforms. He explained that: "Once there is a discovery of a fraudulent act, early legal assistance is critical to ensure the correct strategy is put in place to prevent the fraudsters and any further harm."

UAE police authorities continue to educate the public to be wary of such scams, reiterating that sensitive personal information, such as bank account details, should be kept private all the time, and that in case they are targeted by a scammer, they should report it immediately.



BE PREPARED AND BEWARE OF THESE SCAMS

WHATSAPP HACKING SCAM

TRA has urged all not to respond to any "troubleshooting" messages from unknown sources on WhatsApp. The message supposedly signed by the "WhatsApp Support Team" reads: "After scanning to our servers, we found that your account is not confirmed and it will be deleted because someone is claiming to have that account."

It further claims that an authentication

code has been sent to the registered mobile number to confirm that account's authenticity. The user is asked to send the code back on the same chat to "verify" the account, or else the WhatsApp account will be closed within 24 hours. TRA states that the WhatsApp application does not correspond with users via text, warning that communicating with such messages could result in your WhatsApp account being hacked.



GET 'FREE' TICKETS



Emirates airline has cautioned the public not to participate in an online survey scam in return for free tickets. People are being sent links to a fake Emirates website and asking them to answer a survey.

The airline warns the public against such links. "Emirates has become aware of fraudulent websites purporting to

offer free airline tickets to those who take an online survey. We advise anyone not to click on any links or share these links on social media. Emirates is investigating the source of the scam and will take appropriate legal action against the perpetrators, the airline said in a statement.

ADVANCE FEE SCAM

The Dubai Financial Services
Authority (DFSA), an entity within the
Dubai International Financial Centre
(DIFC), has issued an advisory
against an advance fee scam.
The scammers use a false loan
agreement document that displays
the DIFC logo and the name of the
DIFC governor, assuring loans of
up to \$125 million (Dhs458.75mn)
provided a handling fee of \$10,000
(Dhs36,729) is paid along with
\$400,000 (Dhs1,469,192) for meeting
the expenses required to facilitate

the loan. These are refundable, once the deal is done, states the e-mail.

The scam artists also use a fake DIFC letter, purportedly from the DIFC's "Loan Committee", in their effort to make the offer "visually genuine". The DFSA states that consumers should bear in mind that the DIFC does not provide loans, hence it doesn't collect any fees or charges in relation to any financing. It has advised individuals to not respond to any communication regarding the scam, and under no circumstances transfer any money to any party involved in the scam.



MONEY TRANSFER SCAM



The Emirates National Oil Company (ENOC) has warned customers and people against responding to scams using its name. People are being informed that the firm's account number has been changed and the money transfers should be made to the new account number.

ENOC has asked residents to contact them on 800 ENOC Ethic (800 3662 38442) or www.enoc. ethicspoint.com in order to check the authenticity of the communication. The oil major has also urged people to beware of recruitment, advance fee and grants/rewards scam.







HOW TO AVOID BEING SCAMMED?

- 1 Check the relevant regulatory agency's website to see if the company you are dealing with is listed and regulated. You can even contact the regulator to verify whether the company is regulated.
- 2 Do general searches (e.g. on Google) to see what information can be found out about the company you are dealing with.
- 3 Only deal with people you trust. Dealing with individuals you have never met carries a higher risk.
- 4 Get independent advice before entering into a transaction, or get a second opinion from a trusted
- 5 Keep paperwork safe. When entering into any new relationship, ensure you maintain records of all paperwork you receive and keep records of all your meetings and conversations. This will assist in the event that you need to take any action.
- 6 If you receive an offer of an amazing deal out of the blue, don't believe it. If it seems too good to be true, then it is probably a scam.

- 2 Fraudsters usually request targets to keep business proposals etc confidential.

THIS IS NOT WHO WE ARE

The man who made a viral video before a UAE-India football match hasn't respected the spirit of tolerance and friendship that underpins this society

t was expected that the authorities would intervene and put a stop to the actions committed by those considered to be supporters of the UAE team. These actions include the video clip that went viral before the game between the UAE and India in the AFC Asian Cup, held in Abu Dhabi in early January. The clip shows a person detaining a few people of apparently Asian nationalities inside a bird cage, forcing them to say that they would support the UAE – because they live in this country – and not India during the match.

What this person has done goes beyond humour – if humour

was the aim – and it represents something that is insulting to the people of the UAE. It is an even greater insult to us than to the nation of India, a country for which our people harbour deep respect, friendship, and appreciation, and with which old relations exist, going back to a time even before the UAE was founded, before oil appeared in this land, before this region knew the progress we now witness.

Unfortunately, some malevolent satellite television channels exploited the clip, and promoted it with hostility towards us.

The behaviour of this person certainly does not truly manifest the morals of our people, our values, or our respect for others

who live here or with whom we are connected by human relations and common interests.

India, in particular, has a special place in the hearts of Emiratis, for they have known it and journeyed to it since olden times for commerce, medical treatment, and tourism. Indeed, some of the sons of the UAE travelled to India to receive education when there were no official schools in the country, and when there were no colleges or universities. Some of those that returned from India became distinguished figures in the

UAE after the establishment of the state.

Hence, the public prosecution was right when it summoned the person responsible for the video clip, given that his conduct is a crime punishable by UAE law. The General Command of Sharjah Police was right to deal with the matter with seriousness.

In the fifth principle of Dubai's eight defining principles of governance declared by His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, it was emphasised that our society is distinguished by work, discipline, compliance with pledges, and

respect for time. Furthermore, His Highness said that we are modest in times of success, perseverant when facing challenges, spreaders of good and benevolence, and open to all. We aim for a society in which respect prevails, and all its components are connected by a spirit of tolerance, while shunning racism and discrimination.

We are surprised that some do not know those principles that our leaders emphasise, and how they do not apply them while living in Emirati society. We are even more surprised for them to act in this fashion at a time when we are in the 'Year of Tolerance'. Do they not see the leaders and people of this nation manifesting the

most splendid examples of tolerance?

Social media has become a means for those seeking fame. However, the UAE recognised from the start that some would exploit this platform to gain recognition at the expense of the homeland's reputation and, accordingly, it embarked on enacting laws to combat discrimination and hatred.

The person who shot this video debased himself, and showed that he is oblivious to the good seeds of this country and the noble legacy of Sheikh Zayed, the founding father.

BAKE SOME HEARTS

Yes, this is the month of all things sweet and cloying. Even if you're a baking novice, here's a great excuse to try making heart-shaped cookies. You need the following tools and ingredients: a microwave oven; a heart-shaped cookie-cutter; slightly softened butter (100g); sugar (50g); milk (1 tbs); flour (175g); cocoa powder (2-3 tbs); a pinch of salt. Mix everything and stir and knead until it's at the consistency of plasticine aka play dough; pour a little more milk, if need be, but you don't want to make it too gooey. Now roll the cookie dough into small balls, and then flatten each dough ball with anything handy, even the bottom of a steel bowl will do. When the flattened cookie dough is ready, use the cookie-cutter to make heart shapes from the dough. Put together the leftover dough from the edges to make roughly shaped cookies. Bung everything into the microwave and cook for 5 minutes. If the microwave has a 'bake' option, then you're sorted. Or else you'll need to fiddle with the controls a bit – too high

WHO: SAMUEL SUNDAY WHERE: BAYELSA, NIGERIA WHEN: JANUARY 2019

A man was arrested for poisoning all his sons three of them - with an insecticide called Sniper, apparently on the suspicion that the boys were practising witchcraft and were responsible for his illness. Two of the sons died; the third named Success. 14. survived and recorded his statement. Samuel Sunday and his brother Aya Preye allegedly tied up his sons, and forced them to drink the insecticide. Police said that both would be charged with

murder – the two victims were called Miracle, 12, and God's Time, 10. According to the News Agency of Nigeria,

Sunday was divorced, and his children lived with their grandmother for a while before this incident.

WHO: LIAM DEANE

WHERE: WAKEFIELD, WEST YORKSHIRE, UK

WHEN: JULY 2017

Not everyone who's biologically able to have to a child isn't always fit to be a parent. That was clear from the case of Liam Deane, 22, who punched and violently shook his two-day-old baby daughter. That's right, she's an absolute newborn.

The little baby, Luna, was with her father while her mother took a nap. When the baby cried, and kept crying, Deane drove his fist into her face, shook her, squeezed her – she didn't stand a chance in the face of such an attack. Doctors at the intensive care unit where she died reported that she had "catastrophic brain injuries". During a police interview, the father admitted to the attack; he was convicted of murder and sent to prison.

While Deane was in prison, another inmate, named John

Westland, 29, killed him. Not that Westland himself was a paragon; he was in jail for rape and grievous bodily harm. For Deane's murder, Westland was given a life sentence, with at least 19 years to serve.



WHO: CLAIRE BARNETT

WHERE: BEVERLEY, EAST YORKSHIRE, UK

WHEN: MARCH 2014

Busy on Facebook, Claire Barnett, 31, didn't notice that her son, two-year-old Joshua, had fallen into the garden pond. It took just minutes for Joshua to drown. Eventually, Claire noticed the accident and called for help, and took the boy to the hospital, but it was too late.

During the investigations, it came out that Claire had always been a neglectful mother. At first, she gave the police a variety of stories on what happened in the garden. It was revealed that some months earlier, in August 2013, she had let Joshua, then an infant, play outside on the road. At that time, her neighbours had called social services, seeing the little boy getting almost run over.

Sentencing her to five years in prison for child cruelty, the judge referred to her "bad parenting" and told Claire that she was a danger to any child for whom she took responsibility. The judge said, "Your son died due to your neglectful conduct. You will have to live with that for the remainder of your life."



WHO: BEN BUTLER

WHERE: SUTTON, LONDON, UK

WHEN: OCTOBER 2013

A violent man who was first treated leniently by a judge eventually killed his six-year-old daughter. He got a life term, but it was too late. Ben Butler had his daughter Ellie returned to his care, from the child's grandparents, after a custody battle. Just 11 months later, she had been killed; her father had inflicted severe head injuries on her.

In 2009, Butler had been convicted of violently shaking the little girl - Ellie would have been about two years old then - but this conviction was quashed in the Family Court, where the judge exonerated him, seeing him as a victim of the miscarriage of justice. At that time, the child's grandfather, who had cared for the baby, had raised objections, and warned of more violence from Butler, but the Family Court set him free. In the 2013 incident, the child's mother Jennie Gray was found guilty of distorting the course of justice. The killer father got 23 years in jail, while the mother got 42 months.





THE BRUTAL STRANGER

AN UNSUSPECTING YOUNG WOMAN ANSWERS A KNOCK ON THE DOOR, ONLY TO HAVE THE WORST EXPERIENCE OF HER LIFE

hen lust, greed, absence of reason, and lack of moral, educational, and religious restraints come together, a human being turns into a ferocious and uncontrollable creature, looking for any prey to attack in order to satisfy his inferior desire.

That's what happened one day, when 29-year-old Mane'a left his 25-year-old wife Geitha'a alone at home as usual, heading out for his electrical and sanitary appliances store, which he managed with his brother. It was a typical day, and the wife was at home on her own before midday. Then, she heard a few light knocks on the front door. She rushed to answer the door, thinking that it was her brother Khalfan, whom she was expecting.

But as soon as she opened the door, she was stunned – there was a stranger at her threshold; a stranger who had wrapped a cloth around his face, leaving only the eyes and the forehead visible. In an instant, he pounced on her, holding a knife in his right hand. With his other hand, the intruder grabbed the woman - he was strong and threatened to kill her if she shouted, screamed, or resisted.

He dragged Geitha'a further inside the house, pulling her by the hair, and heading towards the bedroom. While dragging her, he also kept hitting her, trying to weaken her. The poor woman, scared out of her wits and injured from his assault, couldn't fight back.

But still, she screamed and tried to resist. Unfortunately, the house was in a relatively newly built neighbourhood, and there was no one around to hear her cries for help - her screams were also not audible to anyone outside because the criminal had shut the bedroom door, having dragged her in, and clamped his hand over her mouth.

Having subdued her, the intruder tried to tear her clothes off and tried to rape her, ignoring her objection and strong resistance. He stripped off his own clothes with one hand; the other hand kept the knife blade close to her face. His intention was to frighten her into letting him do what he wanted; but she just wouldn't give in to his lust.

Frustrated, the intruder held the knife to her throat and wanted to know where all her jewellery was kept. If she didn't tell him, death was inevitable, he warned her.

The frightened woman pointed to the wooden closet, without uttering a word. She was shaking from head to toe.

Her assailant opened the wardrobe,

took out the jewellery box and found it completely empty. The criminal dropped the box – he was agitated and furious.

The box happened to be empty because Mane'a, the husband, took the jewellery that morning, with the consent and knowledge of his wife, because he urgently needed money.

The criminal realised that there was nothing he'd get in the house; he rushed out of the front door, leaving his victim in a state of nervous breakdown.

Despite her extreme distress, Geitha'a somehow managed to call her husband, and said in a faint voice filled with fear, "Come quickly please. I am scared. Do not be late. It is very dangerous."

Mane'a rushed back, and found his wife crying, semi-naked, in a pitiful state. "What happened? Tell me what happened? Why are you crying? For God's sake, tell me what happened, what's the story, my precious one?" he kept asking, but his wife only cried even more.

The husband was doing his best to wipe her tears and to understand what has happened. "Why is she almost naked?" "Why is the empty jewellery box tossed on the floor near the door?" "Why is the bed messed up?" Many questions raced through his mind, as his eyes took in the state of the room.

Mane'a called his in-laws, asking them to come over immediately for a serious matter. His parents came, and Geitha'a then revealed everything. After they calmed her down, her father and husband suggested immediately going to the police.

They did so, and the victim was sent by the police for a medical test. The report said that "there are abrasions on her face, upper chest, neck, and other parts of her body; but there is nothing to confirm the occurrence of rape".

Meanwhile, officers of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) were working on several fronts at a rapid pace. They noticed a number of construction workers building a new house next to the victim's house. They deduced, based on their long experience, that one of the workers might have an association with the crime. All the workers - about 10 of them - were brought to the police station for interrogation. At the same time, the victim was called in for an identification parade.

The head of CID at the police station, Major Khalid, ordered that the suspects be lined up, so that Geitha'a could identify the criminal. assuming he was there. She took a close look at all of them; and then suddenly, she stood in front of one worker, and screamed, "That's him, sir! He is the criminal. I remember his clothes, his appearance, and forehead."

The victim asserted that this particular worker was her assailant - she knew this because though he had hidden his face when he attacked her, the mole on his forehead had been visible. That distinguishing feature helped her identify the intruder.


Geitha'a then lodged a complaint in the form of a personal action against the accused, a 35-year-old worker called Shamel.

It turned out that he had previously worked in the victim's house almost a year ago. Then, while he worked on the construction of the nearby house, Shamel watched the movements of the husband and wife. One day, unleashing his abominable thoughts, he decided to attack and rape the young woman.


When in court, Shamel initially denied his crime; he denied knowing the victim at all. However, a background check confirmed that he did work on the construction of the house where Mane'a and Geitha'a lived.

The victim confirmed to the court that the accused, who stood in the dock, was the same person who had broken into her house. She confirmed the beating, the rape attempt, and the robbery attempt at knifepoint.

Shamel had been sentenced guilty of two criminal offences: attempt to rape by force and threatening, and incomplete attempted aggravated burglary. He was sent to prison, to be followed by deportation, and also asked to pay a fine to the victim as compensation for material and moral damages.







e continue the story of the explorations of Freya Stark, a British writer and adventurer, who learned Arabic and read the Quran as a student, and then visited the Middle East and North Africa, as well as India and China.

Our last chapter ended with Stark's goodbye to her host in Al-Makalla: "When I decided to leave, I went early in the morning to thank Prince Salem bin Ahmad bin Al-Qe'eti. His wife contemplated me with velvety beautiful eyes. I completed what I had to do in order to head for the town of Do'an."

Before we go into what Stark said about her journey, we say that Do'an is located in a valley bearing its name. During the reign of the Al-Qe'eti Sultanate, the name of the area became Do'an District; a number of villages, most notably Hajarain and Meshed, are spread across the foothills of the valley.

Going back to her travels, we say, "The Al-Qe'eti Sultan had arranged a car for Freya to move around in and ordered one of his bodyguards to accompany and protect her and look after her. In addition, he provided her with the food needed for her journey. At first, she arrived at the village of Thile, located behind Makalla Mountain, where she met the 'Mansab' Muhammad ibn Ahmad ba'Omar, a descendant of Sheikh Sa'id bin Isa Amudi. The 'Mansab' is a title or position for masters (sadah) and senior clerics who

are considered authorities in religious and social matters and they are devoted to worship. This status was mentioned in the book titled al-Mansab, with an 's' and not a heavy 's' (Sadh), and we have corrected it."

Stark wrote: "Then the 'Mansab' came to us and took us all to the house. The faces of the 'Mansab', his two sons, and his little grandson had charming expressions of kindness. They sat down and spoke as they drank coffee mixed with ginger. The house, which is used for hosting the Bedouins who come to their spiritual leader for help or counsel, was old.

"The next morning, we left the town heading for Do'an across a mountainous terrain; we arrived after three or four days. Before reaching Do'an, we arrived at the castle of Masna'a and passed through the gate; a welcoming shot was fired. Then, they led us by a narrow passage into a pillared and whitewashed room, where the Governor Muhammad Ba Surra and his brother Ahmad stood to welcome me, surrounded by their tribal retinue holding rifles. We all sat on the ground and drank coffee.

"I spent twelve days with the Ba Surra and got to know them well, and it would be hard to find a more charming family anywhere. The two brothers live together in the fortress in harmony, sharing the weight of the government between them. Their people

love them and say, 'Ba Surra, our father.'

"The houses of Do'an are all more or less alike, with rooms supported by intricately carved wooden pillars. Then, Ahmad, the Governor's brother, took me to see the building of his new palace, where the builders were singing as they slapped the slabs of mud and straw into the mud foundation. After that, I met Muhammad's wife, who is the lady of the castle, who was still beautiful, decorated with necklaces, so smiling in an air of prosperity and favour, though her daughter Nur had been married for several years.

"When I met Nur, she became my chief friend and companion when I visited the harem, and she used to bring my food and sit and talk to me. She had a charming nature and kindness to anyone who came. Her husband had left her three years ago to work abroad, as most of the men of Hadhramaut do, and he used to write to her with every third or fourth ship that touched the coast. As this was the first time she was left alone, she was staying with her family.

"None of the women I met could read; they would cook, and any number of tribesmen would turn up to eat at any time. Most of the time, they call on each other from one house to the other in the fortress.

"When I met them in the room of the mother of Ahmad, each woman kissed her hand and sometimes her head. No men were allowed to enter these private rooms without warning. However, the two Governors used to come into my room, fluttering the women in flight before them. On one occasion, they brought with them Sayyid Muhammad ibn Yassin, an old cotton merchant. Another guest was there, an old man who had worked with the British and had been made Khan Bahadur for keeping order, after which he retired and settled in private life. He told me his story, and how he closely followed political affairs in this country, and about the Italians who were preparing for their Abyssinian venture.

"One day, Muhammad took me to see his bees and how they live in a pipe made of mud, covered with blankets to keep it warm, and closed from one end, with some small holes, where honey is collected in baskets. The honey of Hadhramaut is famous and is exported in round tins, and has a rich and heavy flavour, due no doubt to the 'ilb' trees,





whose blossom is the bees' chief food."

Stark continued her writings, mentioning that she caught a serious disease in Do'an and was taken care of; when she recovered, she was ready to travel again.

JOURNEY TO HAJARAIN

Freya Stark left the town of Do'an on horseback with a guarded convoy arranged by Sultan Ahmad Ba Surra, the co-governor of Do'an. The explorer described her ride to Hajarain: "Across the valley, the towns on either side faded into the rocks. The fields were empty, waiting for the floodwater or torrent (seil) which takes the place of rain; the earth lay in hard clods turned over by the peasants to a depth of about two metres where they would grow millet; and many dry channels were dug.

"Next, we met a deputy of Sultan Ba Surra, rested, and then continued our journey until we reached the town of Ghaidun, where the shrine of Ahmad ibn Isa, the grandfather of the Mansab, is. I would have stopped to visit it if I had not felt so ill. We went on with our ride, heading north. As the sun set, we saw the rock of Hajarain before us. Hajarain appeared as a shape of blackness, showing only one light on the hill. We walked towards it and saw a number of

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hives that cordoned the town's wells.

"Then we arrived at a studded gate and a high threshold, we knocked and heard a shouting within; they were expecting us. They opened the gate and led us to where the representative of the Governor of Makalla stood by the mosque to welcome us. The mosque also had a well with a beehive roof


and a square, then circular, and then another square minaret, which is the most ancient type found in Hadhramaut. The Sayyid came up and led me to the inner rooms of the harem and gave me the ladies' own apartment.

"In the morning, the notables came to visit me. They rose with respect when the Mansab of Meshed, Sheikh Ahmad al-Attas, entered. He ruled the valley below Hajarain, where the jurisdiction of Makalla ends. He came in regally, voluminous in a green velvet gown with a yellow turban on his head; in his hand, he had a silver-headed cane. He was humble, with the ease of sure authority and a manner parentally affectionate. He told me about the history of the place where the grandfather of the Mansab settled, a holy man called Hasan al-Attas. His bronze carved tomb lies with three others under three white domes.

"Then, he lent me his horse to visit the ancient ruined city, which stretches over a large area in uneven mounds with dull red or black shards of pottery, slips of flint, and obsidian, where beads of carnelian were scattered in incredible numbers. On the tops of several hillocks are ruined walls. When my visit was over, I decided to leave by car."

The traveller went on talking about her trip, though names, facts, and events were





mixed up; and moved from one place to another; and talked about one sultan then another; and gave examples with strange facts that were unrelated to the subject. Therefore, we will limit ourselves to excerpts of her writings about the towns that she passed through before she arrived in Shibam, where her journey ended.

TOWN OF SEIYUN

Seiyun was known to be the capital of the Al-Kathiri Sultanate that we talked about in the previous chapter. About the town, Stark said, "Seiyun stretched inside a large bay on the farthest side of the valley between palm trees and wheat, and its gardens were filled with birds. Sayvids from Al-Kaf took me to the house of the Sultan.

"The town is the most delightful of towns with houses rich with every variety of delicate lacework, and the drains are all covered. The Sultan, Ali ibn Mansur, is a middle-aged, comfortable and kind man. In the palace, there is a telephone; and beyond the palace is the palace of Sayyid Abu Bekr Al-Kaf, which was still under construction with gardens to be copied from Europe. Then, we left for the town of Tarim."

TOWN OF TARIM

When Stark arrived in the town of

Tarim, she started to talk about the town and the Al-Kaf Sayyids. Here are some excerpts from her book: "Tarim is proud of its faithfulness, and is still the city of religion par excellence in a country which is all considered a stronghold of religion in Islam. Tarim is said to have 360 mosques. Moreover, Al-Kaf Sayyids are broadminded and progressive and their noble tradition of hospitality attracts all Europeans to them.

"In the house of Sayyid Abu Bekr, I enjoyed the luxuries of civilisation in a guest room enclosed in four doors and eight windows of coloured glass. I learned that they are forty families, all rich and beneficent. They run the Sultanate, schools, trade, and the army. They have minted a small coinage, which has a local value. I met many pleasant people there and was invited to the Shabab youth club, headed by Sayyid Omar, and there I answered questions about the education of women.

"A man rose to make a speech to welcome me as the first woman from Europe to travel alone. I was touched by the well-chosen kindness of his words. Then, I visited a private school for the children of Al-Kaf. Next morning, the brother and nephew of Sayyid Abu Bekr came to see me off, and I was sorry to leave them all. We left the town in a car heading for the town of Shibam."

BREAKDOWN IN SHIBAM

Stark left Tarim by car on her way to Shibam, as the last stop before visiting the legendary destroyed city of Shabwa. When she arrived in Shibam, she felt the symptoms of a severe disease. She wrote: "I was losing my strength little by little, and thought I had little time left. I was afraid of fainting and being buried alive. One day, while I lay very ill, a Bedouin from the town of Qatn came to see me and said to me: 'Allah heal you; Allah restore you; and bestow good upon you. No good comes but from Allah, may He be praised and exalted.' It was a beautiful blessing, said so earnestly. I was unable to give him anything, for I could not rise.

"One day, I heard a buzzing sound. There were four Royal Air Force planes coming from the southeast, circling and landing east of the city. Then Dr Thwayte made his way to my place, where he found me too ill. The next day, they strapped me into a stretcher, laid me into a car, and drove me to the plane. The pilot welcomed me; and after five hours we landed in Aden."

Here, the story of this adventurous woman, the traveller, ends. She returned to London to write this story, without realising her dream of discovering the city of Shabwa, which she considered to be the capital of the Kingdom of Sheba.

Massive sea clean-up organised in Abu Dhabi

CAMPAIGNS to restore the natural surroundings to their pristine state are undertaken frequently in the UAE. While beach clean-ups are common, a recent underwater clean-up was a remarkable event for the amount of trash it took out of the sea bed.

The event was organised by the Environment Agency Abu Dhabi (EAD) and the Abu Dhabi International Marine Sports Club (ADIMSC). It took place at Al Mirfa port as part of a campaign called 'Together We Make a Difference', which started in 2018.

Ahmad Al Hashemi, Acting Executive Director, Terrestrial and Marine Biodiversity sector at Environment Agency Abu Dhabi, said: "Preventing marine pollution is the first step in promoting the protection and sustainable management of our local marine ecosystems, as well as human health."

How does UAE enhance weather condition for rain?

TO enhance the country's water security, the UAE has been trying to enhance the conditions for rainfall. And where does rain come from? Moistureladen clouds, of course. So, the country has been creating more of those up in the sky.

In the past year, around 10-15 per cent of the country's rainfall came from cloud seeding operations undertaken by the National Centre of Meteorology (NCM). "In 2018, the number of our cloud seeding operations reached 187, and this was mainly dependent on the number of clouds that were amenable for cloud seeding. We are always ready to carry out more missions but we need the right type of clouds in order for us to successfully launch our operations," said Sufian Farrah, cloud-seeding expert at NCM.

"We're not making rain, we are only

enhancing the conditions, and in 2018 about 10-15 per cent of rainfall was a result of our cloud seeding operations," he said. Cloud seeding is done by putting substances in the air that help clouds dispense

their moisture. Following the NCM's operations, it rained more and rained longer in the UAE.

Farrah explained that the Centre had six full-time pilots and four Beechcraft King aircraft that fly towards any clouds suitable for cloud seeding. "In the early morning, we look at the weather



patterns, and if we see that the right type of clouds is going to accumulate over some area, then we send our pilots and aircraft to the target place. It usually takes around three minutes and depends on how large the cloud is, and the reaction to these materials is about 10-15 minutes," he added.

Sniffer dog catches 116kg of rhino horn



THE relentless assault on rhinoceroses in Africa continues, as is evident from a recent catch of rhino horns hidden in a shipment. The hero of the day was a police dog named Lizzy, a sniffer that helped the authorities seize 116kg of

illegal rhino horn being smuggled out of

The 36 horns and some horn fragments were worth about \$1.3 million (Dhs4.77 mn). This was one of the biggest seizures in South Africa in recent years.

The trafficked animal parts were hidden in eight boxes, amongst decorations and doormats.

The scale of rhino killing is beyond belief it's estimated that in South Africa, between 2007 and 2014, the rate of poaching increased some 9,000 per cent. Conservation groups believe that since 2014, the poaching rate has dropped a little,

but about 1,000 rhinos still continue to be killed in SA every year. Most of the horns are shipped to Asian countries.

Rhino horns are made of the same substance as the human fingernail - it's called keratin.

Keep the cake away from children



DRAWING attention to problems such as obesity, tooth decay and other negative fallouts of excessive sugar intake, the organisation Public Health England (PHE) has said that most children in the UK, by the time they're 10 years old, have already crossed the maximum recommended sugar intake limit for an 18-year-old.

PHE has suggested imposing a 'pudding tax' for excessively sweet processed foods, passing the onus on manufacturers to ensure healthier food.

The recommended daily intake is measured in sugar equivalent of a certain number of sugar cubes. For children aged 4-6 years, the recommended intake is a maximum of five cubes (19g); for 7-10 years, the recommended limit is six cubes (24g); and for 11 years or above that, the limit is up to seven cubes (30g). But children in the UK consumed, on an average, 52g of sugar or about 13 cubes, as found in the National Diet and Nutrition Survey, PHE cited.

Where was all this sugar hidden? Sweetened drinks, cookies, cakes, synthetic puddings, sugary breakfast cereals etc. PHE has urged the food processing industry to cut 20 per cent of this hidden sugar by 2020. Dr Alison Tedstone, chief nutritionist at PHE, told the BBC that if the industry didn't take enough action, "there would be a case for fiscal measures", meaning a tax.

Screen time might not be so harmful for kids, experts say

ONE of the most common sights in the modern world - that of a child glued to a mobile or tablet - is also rather worrying for parents. Reams are written about how constant gadget use hurts eyesight, causes attention deficit, affects sleep, and so on. Well, some of that still holds true, but parents can now relax a little.

Based on the findings of several studies, including one in the BMJ Open medical journal, the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH), UK, has issued some guidelines for under-18s. There was, indeed, some association between a higher rate of screen use and problems like weight gain and depression. However, the cause-and-effect relationship was not very clear, so the gadgets were given the

benefit of doubt.

The RCPCH has prepared a questionnaire for families to help them assess the impact of screen use. The questions are: Is your family's screen time under control? Does screen use interfere with what your family want to do? Does screen use interfere with sleep? Are you

able to control snacking during screen time? Dr Russell Viner, president of the

RCPCH, said: "We need to stick to advising



parents to do what they do well, which is to balance the risks and benefits. One size doesn't fit all, parents need to think about what's useful and helpful for their child."



Is your PC a pain in the neck? It's time to lean back

DO you belong to the Republic of Slightly Hunched People? The ones that are stooped over their laptop or desktop keyboard, head jutting forward? If you do, it's time to lean back and think what that slouched posture is doing to your neck and shoulder muscles.

A study on the health impact of this posture was published in the journal Biofeedback, and as you can imagine, the findings aren't great. San Francisco State University Professor of Holistic Health Erik Peper, Associate Professor of Health Education Richard Harvey and their colleagues carried out the research.

The study was in two phases: first, they asked 87 students to sit upright, heads properly aligned with the necks and asked them to turn their heads; then the students were asked to "scrunch" their necks, tilt their heads forward, and again turn their heads. The straight position made it much easier to turn their heads compared to the hunched position.



Also, 125 students held the "scrunch" position for 30 seconds, following which they complained of some pain in the head or neck.

Electromyography equipment revealed that tension in the trapezius muscle (covering the back of the neck and shoulder blades) increased in the scrunched, head jutting forward position.

Peper said, "When your posture is tall and erect, the muscles of your back can easily support the weight of your head and neck. But when your head juts forward at a 45-degree angle, your neck acts like a fulcrum, like a long lever lifting a heavy object. It's not surprising people get stiff necks and shoulder and back pain." To avoid this situation, lift the height of your PC monitor, increase the font size of the text you're reading or writing, or take any other measure to keep your head straight on your neck.

Bran wave: A promise of naturally preserve food



THE explosion of packaged food means a huge dose of synthetic preservatives on your plate. Not a desirable thing at all. But researchers from Pennsylvania State University, US, may have a solution.

They studied compounds called

alkylresorcinols (AR), which are produced naturally by plants such as wheat, rye and barley. The compounds act as natural preservatives, preventing the growth of mould or bacteria on the grain kernels. These ARs are found on grain bran,

which is the hard, outer shell of grain. The scientists looked at whether this bran could vield a natural alternative to synthetic preservatives.

Andrew S Elder, doctoral candidate in food science, said, "Consumers want clean labels - they want synthetic chemical-sounding ingredients removed because of the fact that they don't recognise them, and that some of them (the ingredients) have purported toxicity. There are not many natural alternatives for synthetic antioxidants. Our work is focused on identifying new natural antioxidants to extend the shelf life of food and meet consumer demands."

Bran, a by-product of commercial grain production, is either thrown away or mixed in animal feed. Elder said, "We're taking something that's usually discarded in a waste stream and turning it into something useful."

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
